I heard rave reviews about the Thanksgiving meal prepared by the restaurant, and better things about the meal this past Saturday the 25th of November. The Saturday

for. We reached the quorum total of 952 which allows us to tally the votes and pass the Special Assessment. As of Wednesday the 29th of November, we had received 1015 votes. The vote was tallied, and the totals were 980 YES votes and 35 NO votes. The assessment has passed, and we can now move forward with the projects that the line of credit was established for. The only thing that is in our way is the City of Pembroke Pines. The permit process is very difficult to work with and we have three huge projects just waiting on the permit allowing the work to start. Once the work begins, you will be seeing construction vehicles bearing the name of Gemstone, and you will see roofing company trucks bearing the name of Cool Roof Foam & Coatings. Buildings 9, 42, & 52 will each have major construction work done to them, and 31 & 51 will each have one balcony worked on. Buildings 51, 52, & 5, will have the roofs completely removed and a new polyurethane roof installed. Buildings 1, 2, 10, 28, 30. 39, 41, 42, 56, 58, 60, & 61 will have the roofs fixed and then have a silicone roof system applied that will give those roofs new life expectancy of 15 – 20 years. There's so much happening and the sooner the work gets started, the better.

The holiday season is also upon us. We, Pam & I, want to wish each and every one of you a glorious and prosperous Season. We always want to give thanks and prayers to our Troops that are stationed all around the world doing everything possible to protect us and to all of those that are being oppressed. Treasurer's Message From the desk of Rosalie Labate

Special Assessment Vote Requires Quorum



A preliminary review of our October financial statements indicates we are at 66.26% of our annual budget. We are being advised that the long

awaited Reserve Study report is expected to be presented imminently. It is essential we review and analyze this report and develop, and put in place, procedures and policies to implement the necessary required State mandates to fully fund our SIRS category reserves.

As we have previously indicated, the SIRS (Structural Integrity Reserve Study) categories are: Roofs, painting, paving, structural (concrete), electrical, plumbing. Our General Manager, Eric Wheeler, Controller Alex Ivanskas will be analyzing the facts and figures and report back to us their findings and what steps will be needed to satisfy the State mandate and our community needs.

The proxy vote on the approval of our Special Assessment was November 29, 2023. A quorum of 952 proxies was re-

quired to implement this special assessment. We surpassed the quroum and had a total of 1015 votes in favor of the Special Assessment. We thank all residents who showed up to their Phase Town Hall meetings in the days leading up the Special Assessment vote, those who submitted their proxy votes and those who attended the vote on November 29, 2023.

Attendance at our Hollybrook restaurant has certainly improved but our revenue flow is still needing a much better increase. The improvements are readily noticeable –the quality of food, the service, variety of menu items, all enhancing our restaurant. Michael Fishman and the staff at the restaurant are diligently trying to make our Hollybrook restaurant something we all can enjoy. If you haven't already passed by - treat yourself to dinner on Saturday nights now that they have dinner service that day!

The month of December is full with lots of days celebrating a multitude of holidays, Hanukkah, Kwanzaa, Christmas, Boxing Day, and New Year. Season Kicks off with Special Assessment Preparation



Welcome back to friends and neighbors. It is exciting to connect with residents who returned to Hollybrook for the season.

The officers and the Board of Administration(BOA) along with both Eric Wheeler and Alex Ivanaskas have spent many hours identifying and clarifying the need for a Special Assessment. A well-attended Town Hall Meeting was held on Tuesday, November 14, 2023, to help unit owners understand the

challenges facing Hollybrook and to answer questions regarding the necessity of the Special Assessment. We are currently gathering Proxy Votes and we are optimistic that we will reach the requisite number of 952 Unit Owners in the very near future to approve this Special Assessment.

Kudos also to the Financial Committee on the Special Assessment, chaired by Mark Weurzburger, who identified Financial Resources and Options for paying the Special Assessment. All Unit Owners have unique financial situations and the committee urged Unit Owners to contact their own financial institutions to determine their willingness to help with the Special Assessment.

Hollybrook is certainly not unique in seeking Unit Owner approval for a Special Assessment. The news media has highlighted these issues and discussions with friends and relatives underscores the financial issues and challenges facing many condominiums throughout the State of Florida. It remains to be seen if the next Florida Legislative Session will pass legislation to help solve or ameliorate some of these challenges.

I am extremely grateful for the volunteers (Karen, Rosalie, Paul, and Terri) who assisted me in distributing the 2023-2024 Restaurant Cards during the extended hours on November 7 and 8, 2023. Many residents who work full time or were unable to pick up their cards earlier took advantage of these additional time slots. We took on the additional task of providing the new Blue Books to our residents and we were able to help more than 70 residents over these two evenings.


Our second Lunch & Learn Lecture Series was attended by approximately 80 people. Working with my liaison, we already have programs planned for December, January, February, and March. Please continue to read the Voice of Hollybrook (VOH), email blasts and monitor your bulletin boards for these free lectures. RSVPs are required for each event since lunch is provided as a part of this Enhancement Program. These catered luncheons also increase restaurant revenue. Again, thanks to our sponsors who paid for the luncheons and kudos to Michael Fishman and his staff for providing awesome dining for the attendees. I wanted to take this opportunity to express my gratitude to our wonderful volunteers and our dedicated staff. Each

event was supported by both staff and volunteers and none of these would have been successful without their help and assistance

The October golf course income was \$114,691 which was less than the revenue generated in October of the 2022-2023 fiscal year (\$143,585). The Hollybrook golf revenue reveals that we reached only 43 percent of our projected yearly golf income of \$1,880,000. Unfortunately, the first seven months of 2022-2023 had greater gross golf income (\$1,172,145) than the same period of 2023-2024 (\$797,381).

A further analysis of golf course gross income in October reveals that the cart fees from our owners were \$20,917 and an additional \$47,340 came from guest fees. As would be expected during season, less of our income comes from outside golfers. Walk-in golfers accounted for \$20,377 of our golf revenue. Our contracts with Golf Now and Canam provided \$20,702. Golf Now revenue was \$8,520 and Canam revenue was \$12,182. Additional sources of golf income were \$2,738 from our military and first responders, driving range fees of \$350 and Par 3 fees were \$860. Fortunately, we also had an additional \$1,408 from other sources.

Alex Ivanaskas and Etna Chery are diligently working with me to collect from owners who are in arrears. We speak regularly with our unit owners who have financial difficulties and try to seek solutions prior to undertaking legal remedies to collect payments. As of November 10, 2023, fifteen owners are currently in Collections with Straley and Otto and at least one of these units went into Collections following the death of the Unit Owner. Hollybrook is truly quite fortunate to have a very small number of accounts in collections. In a condominium community of 1902, we can be extremely proud of both our low number of units sent to Collections as well as the small number of unit owners in arrears.

In 2023, BSO has continued developing innovative solutions focused on the safety and well-being of Broward County. These efforts have made us an even more accountable, efficient organization and a true leader in public safety.

PUBLIC SAFETY: Our commitment to keeping the public safe remains our top priority. By utilizing advanced technology, our Real Time Crime Center (RTCC) can proactively detect potential threats and prevent acts of mass violence before they occur. Our success has been met with an increase in funding, allowing for the expansion of our technological capabilities, further elevating our proactive policing. Our other bold policing initiatives include the Burglary Apprehension Team (BAT) and Violent Intervention Proactive Enforcement Response (VIPER) units. Collectively, these units have brought violent offenders to justice, thwarted dangerous, illegal street racing and participated in various countywide operations to combat violence in our community.

SCHOOL SAFETY: In addition to the RTCC, we continue to implement new programs, bolster training and forge partnerships with local, state and federal law enforcement to enhance school safety. This year, our efforts expanded to address a fast-emerging crime targeting our youth: financial sextortion. We partnered with Broward County Public Schools and the South Florida Internet Crimes Against Children (ICAC) Task Force to launch an educational campaign to raise awareness and prevent further victimization.

TRAINING AND PREPAREDNESS: Training and preparedness are paramount to public safety. As we approach the grand opening of our Research, Development and Training Center (RDTC), we will stay committed to elevating the training techniques, tactics and education for all our first responders and civilian staff. The 108,000-square-foot state-of-the-art training center will be like no other in the state and will serve as a model

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for other public safety agencies to follow.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT: The innovative initiatives we've implemented this year have worked to continue enhancing our relationship with our residents and build trust within our community. Our Neighborhood Support Team is reaching out and collaborating with communities that traditionally shied away from law enforcement. The Park, Walk and Talk program has yielded more than 77,000 encounters with individuals in the community, building bonds of support and resiliency. This year, we had the privilege of investing \$880,000 back into the community, supporting non-profit organizations focused on crime prevention, empowerment and creating lasting and meaningful change in the lives of countless individuals throughout Broward County. In addition, we've launched vital mental health programs to support individuals experiencing mental health crises and connect them to critical community resources instead of putting them in jail.

DIVERSITY: Since day one, I have promoted people from within the organization, which has undoubtedly contributed to our operational success due to the years of valuable institutional knowledge. This year was no exception. I was honored to promote additional women and minorities to leadership positions, further diversifying the organization to reflect our community. I am proud to say that today, BSO has the most diverse command staff in the agency's 108-year history.

ACCOUNTABILITY AND TRANSPARENCY: BSO remains a beacon of accountability and transparency, exemplified by our actions. This year, we welcomed new members to BSO's Social Justice Task Force (SJTF). The task force, launched in 2020 following the murder of George Floyd and the deaths of other persons of color, is comprised of Broward residents, community stakeholders and BSO leaders, who take an active role in addressing community concerns. These efforts achieved transformative and everlasting change for all our residents. In addition, our Office of Inspector General, created in 2021 to ensure the organization runs efficiently, economically and responsibly, continued to investigate employee misconduct allegations thoroughly.

While our primary mission is to ensure the safety and well-being of our residents, we have been recognized locally, nationally and internationally for the exceptional work we do to serve Broward County. I am proud of the remarkable strides we've made in 2023. As we move forward, we will continue to listen to your needs, elevate our training, enhance our capabilities, demonstrate transparency and maintain accountability to achieve our public safety mission.



Great Waste Company has informed Hollybrook that we can now recycle aluminum cans! Unfortuantely, we still cannot recycle any glass or tin cans. So please put all glass products in your black and gray trashbin or the dumpster near your building.

Put recyclables:

Directly into the blue/green recycling bin in your laundry room or trash room containing the following recyclable products: clean cardboard, boxes (broken down), and paper empty and clean plastic containers, empty plastic prescription drug containers and caps into the recycling bin. (It is advisable to remove any personal information from the prescription before you discard it.)

Put trash:

- ✓ Discarded food or food containers, glass or ceramic objects, empty tin cans, dirty paper or plastic products, Styrofoam products, dead batteries, and dead or broken light bulbs
- ✓ Place your beloved cat or dog's poop into a secured plastic bag (or two); all poop goes strictly into the dumpster!

Following these important guidelines will help keep Hollybrook clean and beautiful, and help us better manage our garbage and recycling costs.




Mouthwatering Holiday Eats



Also, if you are looking for something more local, you need look no further than



Originally conceived as a means to update the community and prospective buyers, Hollybrook's newsletter emerged in the early days as a modest publication by Milwaukee developers.

Yet, a tinge of nostalgia hangs in the air as past issues reveal a bygone era where community bonds seemed stronger. Residents shared the minutiae of their lives – recent travels, family gatherings and the ebb and flow of day-to-day life. Clubs and group outings flourished, offering avenues for residents to foster friendships, engage in recreational sports,



A Call to Community



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The Anhinga AKA the Snakebird

When I first started photographing wildlife at Hollybrook it coincided with the Covid 19 lockdown. The most versatile and unique avian was what I had come to know as the Anhinga, or Snakebird. The first sighting I remember was of a male Anhinga standing on a duck decoy floating in the driving range lake, with its wings and tail spread, drying in the early morning sunshine.

Their habitat is primarily in coastal marshes and lakes throughout Florida and along

the Gulf Coast. They're non migratory and typically mate in colonies with Egrets and Herons. They're monogamous and form strong bonds.

The male is distinguished by its overall black plumage with a greenish gloss along with silver white streaks on its upper back and forewings. The female has a pale buff brown head and neck with a black/brown body. While weighing only 3 pounds they have a large wingspan (typically 48") and are superb at flying and diving from great heights.

You can see them all year round at the edges of our lakes on rocks or duck decoys and swimming underwater. If you devote time to watch their fishing behavior, you'll see how unique they are. While like many avians they can dive and spear fish, more often they swim underwater for extended periods of time. You can see them emerge after several minutes underwater like the scope of a submarine. They will spear fish with their sharp bill and throw the fish in the air so that the head of the fish is pointed downwards. They have a unique ability to act almost like a boa constrictor swallowing large fish whole.

Another unique feature that distinguishes the Anhinga is its ability at inter species cooperation to enhance their ability to catch fish in tandem. I have often watched a Tricolored Heron fish at the edge of one of our lakes with an Anhinga fishing



parallel to the Heron. In doing so they channel fish into a narrow path between them, thus allowing them each to catch more fish together. I've seen this behavior many times and it often continues for thirty minutes, until I get tired of following them.

During breeding and nesting, which typically takes place beginning in January and continuing to March they leave Hollybrook and head to their tradition rookeries. You can see them during this period at Wakodahatchee Wetlands, about 40 miles north of Pembroke Pines. The male changes during breeding season with his facial skin and eyes turning blue/green. The females and males share responsibility in building the nest, with the female giving her final approval. Once the eggs are laid the female mostly stays at the nest while the male brings back fish. There are typically three to four eggs per breeding cycle. The nestlings when hatched are voracious and very demanding. Both the male and female bring fish to the nestlings and the chicks stick their entire head and neck down the parents' neck. A scene that appears more uncomfortable than it probably is. Survival of the fittest is on full display, with the weakest often unable to compete for food. In one case I actually witnessed a pair of Woodstorks attack an unattended Anhinga nest flinging them into the water. A week later, on my return, I saw the Woodstorks had taken over the Anhinga nest.

We are incredibly lucky to live in this wildlife refuge, which also acts a a PGA golf course. If interested, put on a good pair of water proof sneakers and walk along the edges of our lakes just after sunrise or before sunset. If you look you'll see the abundance of wildlife and eventually recognize individual behavior patterns. Just make sure to walk away from the active fairways! Good hunting.

MOTION D - TO PURCHASE CHAIRS FOR THE PLAYHOUSE

Paul Tripodi made a motion to postpone until the December 2023 meeting; it was seconded by Reine Fortier.

A vote was taken to postpone the motion; there were 12 affirmative votes (Bergeron, Brittain, DiPuglia, Fortier, McCall, Mack, Mason, Munju, Rice, Tripodi, Webber, and Yost) to postpone, 8 opposing (Donawa, Eaton, Esser-Stuart, Galletta, Goldgut, Ingram, Labate, and Markowski) to postpone, and 2 abstaining (Koch and Lachance) votes. The motion to postpone was passed until the December board meeting.

MOTION E – TO AMEND THE CHELSEA POINT ALLOCATION SYSTEM

Curtis Rice made a motion to amend 3. Golf Booking Pro-

cedure (Chelsea System), H. Tee Time Points Allocation in the Appendices of the Rules and Regulations, as follows: Each unit may have up to 4 tee time system IDs with which to play golf, but with all IDs of a unit being linked to that unit and points being accrued and applied on a per-unit basis. Points are accrued against the condominium units associated with members, not against individual members themselves.

The motion was seconded by Louise Bergeron.

A vote was taken, and the motion passed unanimously with 22 affirmative votes.

Nine-hole tee times are available off of the back nine (7) days a week from 7:00am – 8:24am.

Nine-hole tee times are also available after 3:00pm.

Please note that a nine-hole round is exactly that, nine holes. Golfers are not permitted to pay for nine holes and play as many holes as they can. This will be strictly enforced.

"Non! Non!", he barked!!!!!! "Danger! Danger! Danger!" "What's wrong, Charlie?", I barked.






