#### President's Message From the desk of Alan Eisman



#### Answers to common questions

Summer is now over and we are into fall. Many of you have raised questions concerning issues in Hollybrook. Rather than listening to rumors, listed below are some questions and answers.

#### 1) Why does it take so long for

#### washing machines and dryers to be repaired?

Our contract, that was signed by a previous administration, calls for a machine to be repaired within 2 business days after being reported. There is no penalty clause written into this contract for non- performance. This has been a continuing problem. Our contract with the current company is up soon and we are starting to look at other providers.

#### 2) Why does it seem that some in-house maintenance issues take forever to resolve?

Believe it or not most issues are taken care of within days. There are some more involved problems that could take additional time due to materials needed and also the lack of manpower. We have initiated a central call-in number and person where all maintenance requests go to. It is then sent to the proper person to get it done. This has streamlined the process and created a more accountable system. There has also been a change in responsibilities to different employees which seem to be making a world of difference.

#### 3) How come, if the Board approved a project months ago, nothing has been started?

There are a few different reasons why a project could be taking additional time to get underway. In the past, some contracts were not reviewed by an attorney. There were provisions that were not favorable to Hollybrook. Now, an additional step of reviewing contracts takes place. There are also material considerations. Due to Covid-19 many supply chains have been disrupted and material is just not available. I would not allow the playhouse roof to be started until the contractor has all the material needed on hand. We would not want to be caught with an open roof while awaiting material. The carpet for the tennis courts was four months back ordered, as were the pavers for the patio. We continue to monitor each and every project and make changes when we can, such as switching from pavers to stamped concrete which can now be done in a few weeks weather permitting.

#### 4) Do we now protect ourselves with new contracts?

Yes! All contracts now contain a start and completion date. Larger contracts have a penalty clause as well as retainage held. Retainage is usually 10% of the total contract held back until total completion of work; and if needed, signed off by an inspector. The money we hold back helps protect Hollybrook if the vendor fails to live up to their contract.

#### 5) How often does the board meet?

The board is required to meet at least nine times during the year. We, at Hollybrook, often exceed that number many

#### 6) Why is the Restaurant not open seven days a week and for shorter hours?

During the last year and a half good help has been extremely difficult to get. The current staff were working themselves to exhaustion trying to maintain the expanded hours. It was felt that by opening only five days we would have enough coverage and the staff would have two days a week off. Now that things are getting a bit better, we are again discussing more days and hours.

#### 7) Is our maintenance going to increase hundreds of dollars due to the cost of insurance? Rumor is that we will be hit with a few thousand dollar assessment?

It is true that our insurance costs have increase by about \$850,000.00 and the 40-year study (for building safety recertification) adds about another \$150,000.00 in unanticipated costs to our budget. There is some good news, however. Our golf revenue is currently over \$400,000 ahead of last year. We have so far identified some additional money not spent in previous years - about \$150,000.00 - and there will be additional savings in payroll. We are also watching what we spend. It is too soon to project what will happen, but during the next few weeks I, along with Kyle, Alex and Mary, will be sitting down to review all income and spending. I can guarantee you that any increase will be a last resort. It may be necessary for a special assessment of \$250.00 - which is our limit - but I feel this would be a better resolution to a possible shortfall. As always, I will try to avoid both and will keep you aware of the process as we go forward. There are no secrets here. Each and every one of you deserve and have the right to know how your money is spent.

#### 8) Will other projects that you promised be put on hold?

Yes and no. While some projects were already approved by the board, the funds have been set aside such as the vegetation perimeter along Pines Boulevard. The Phase 6 tennis courts repair has also been allocated for and will be completed. Some smaller projects, such as a dog run, can be funded and we are awaiting some legal issues to be cleared up. The redoing of our pools, chairs, fence and awnings, while still looking to be completed, will have to wait awhile until all budgets are looked at as explained previously.

#### VP Project Update

INSURANCE SEARCH

Your Board created the Insurance Advisory Committee so that, for the first time in 15 years, we made sure that we were getting the best coverage and price for this major annual expense. I have chaired the committee on which George Nozick and the late Towers Director John Campbell have also served. After making sure that the renewal of our property policy in May was the best deal that we could get, we went through the same process for other policies that were due for renewal on October 1.

In mid-July, we had two brokers left in the bidding process to choose the carriers that they would go with to obtain

quotes. I can report that the premium we were presented with by Brown & Brown in September was the best deal. In these times of uncertainty in the Florida insurance world, we were fortunate that our incumbent carriers renewed our policies with reasonable increases. Many other condominium complexes such as ours were denied renewal or faced increases more than double what they paid in the previous year. That is why I made the motion at the September Board meeting to accept the renewal. Your Board made sure that the process was carried out, per Florida Statute, for the first time in 15 years.

#### OWNERS' APPLIANCE & AIR CONDITIONING MAINTENANCE CONTRACT

As previously reported, we reached out to three maintenance companies for competitive prices on the same contract. One of the three did not represent an organization that we could rely on to carry out the contract properly for our resi-

dents. Another did not feel they could agree to the wording of the contract and its obligation. Remember, even though the President of Hollybrook signs the Master Agreement, it is left to the individual owner to sign their own contract. After complaints from numerous owners concerning the wording and exclusions contained in the previous contract, the present Administration felt it necessary to revisit the Master Agreement. With our Legal Chair and the President, we tried to produce a Master Agreement that would meet unit owner needs. General Manager Kyle Hatakeyama picked up the ball and met with the President of TOTAL to iron out our differences. You will see a revised contract for the coming year, which will be sent out next month, that should more clearly meet the needs of our owners.

I have always felt that my duty as an Officer was to work for our owners and defend their interests and I will continue to do so.

Sorry for the oversight in previous columns. I want to thank two additional members of the Security Committee for all their hard work: Joe Riley and Ricardo Santos.

Please Note: Due to the fact that our Financial Secretary has not provided you- the unit owners- with the customary monthly report. I will include a brief recap of it here.

There are 20 units in collection in the amount of \$155,520.

There are six units that have not yet paid July maintenance in the amount of \$8,640. We expect to receive two or three payments in the coming few weeks. This should amount to \$3,000 to \$4,000 dollars. October maintenance is due now and this includes the restaurant card fee. Remember, if you owe any money, no matter how small, you will not receive your restaurant card until your balance is cleared. Cards can be picked up towards the end of October. ## From Broward County District 6 Commissioner Beam Furr Redistricting to happen

Every ten years, one of the most crucial processes in our American democracy happens – redistricting. With the release of new Census Data at the start of every

decade, redistricting begins which can make or break how a community is represented. This year's process has begun in earnest, with a fair and independent drawing of maps at the Broward County Commission level that will shape our politics for the next decade.

Redistricting is required by the United States Constitution. Our founding document mandates that all levels of government – federal, state, and local – undergo the process to coincide with new Census results. The drawing of lines will include new districts for the County Commission, State House and Senate, Congress, School Board and even some cities (including Pembroke Pines) to match the movement of population and demographics. The process often brings significant legal challenges and hotly contested debates due to the significant impact on election results. Even a very small shift in how the line is drawn can completely swing an election to one party or candidate. The stakes are high, and in our polarized environment, they have never been higher.

Each jurisdiction has their own redistricting process, with the Florida State Legislature and Congressional Districts drawn by legislators in Tallahassee *in a closed session*. In

#### 40-Year Recertification inspections, so far smooth sailing

Resident cooperation helps ease process

Broward County's mandatory 40-year condominium recertification is underway in Hollybrook and moving forward without significant safety concerns.

Led by Compliance Officer Beatriz Goycochea, Security Chief Mike Tirado and Inspector Angel Marquez, of G. Batista Engineering & Construction firm, the inspections began in earnest during the second week of September. So far, Buildings 50, 51 and 52 and all units in the Towers have been inspected. As of this report, all except Building 11 in Phase 1 were to be finished by October 6.

Other Hollybrook employees helping in the effort include Vlad Torres, Sands Egerton, Clifton Dinnal and Sydheer Joseph.

Hollybrook management hoped that buildings would be inspected in a continuous flow, and that the project would be completed in a few short months. The



first several weeks were successfully executed in that manner. However, because condominium inspections in Miami-Dade and Broward County became urgent after Champlain Towers South, a beachfront condominium in Surfside, collapsed on June 24 leaving 98 people dead, engineering firms have been saturated with contracts.

"It won't be done as quickly as we expected, but we are not skipping any units or cutting any corners. We are doing whatever is necessary for full safety inspections at every apartment,"

Chief Tirado said.

Hollybrook's contract went to G. Batista Engineering & Construction following an extensive search and bid process. Money for the project had already been allocated and the structural inspection was expanded to include all Hollybrook patios and balconies.

Officer Goycochea said most of the inspection is done outdoors at the exterior of the



Hollybrook dogs that dream of escaping into the freedom of a Pembroke Pines dog park may see their wishes become reality even closer to home.

Ideas for the first Hollybrook dog park are being brainstormed and seriously considered, said President Alan Eisman. "We're putting the word out now to let people know that we're in the idea phase and the dog park is a work in progress," Alan said.

The park that could be erected in the large landscaped

area across from Building 47 at Phase 6, will likely include two double gated entrances, benches, a water source, and dog waste containers.

But what dog park rules would make sense for pet parents and their pooches? "We welcome input and ideas from everyone," Alan said.

Most rules under consideration for the dog park are already mandated for Hollybrook pets wherever they promenade, but here are rules that will likely be implemented at the dog park, too: All dogs must be registered with Hollybrook Animal Control (tagged and current with vaccines); no dogs over 20 pounds will be allowed, no exceptions; owners will be responsible for all of the actions of their dogs; all pet waste must be picked up and disposed into designated containers; gates must be kept closed at all times; and if the dog barks excessively or displays aggressive behavior, the owner must leave the park. Additionally, the dog park hours will be 10 a.m. to sunset Monday through Friday and 11 a.m. to sunset on Saturday and Sunday.

40-Year Recert - Continued from page 12 buildings, but entry into each apartment is essential for checking smoke alarms and electrical panels, and gaining access to patios and balconies. The vast majority of Hollybrook unit owners have complied with rules that require them to provide duplicate door keys to the Security Department for emergencies or instances such as the mandatory inspection. On average, two buildings can be inspected in one work day – but delays occur.

"Some unit inspections can take a few minutes, others more because we don't have a key and have to stop," Officer Goycochea said. In those cases, the locks are changed on the spot and the new keys are held in the Security Department until the unit owner pays the cost of the new lock and picks up the new key.

Residents can help speed indoor inspections by providing the duplicate key; moving items such as artworks, lamps

and furniture away from the front of electric panels; and by making sure smoke detectors are in working order. National Fire Prevention Week, October 3 - 9, is a good time to remember to replace the batteries in your smoke detector. Call the Administration Building for help, if needed.

Unit owners are advised as close to the date of their inspection as possible. Typically, notices are placed at conspicuous

locations on a building scheduled to be inspected within 48 hours. Emails, called eblasts, are also sent by the Communications Office to those unit owners if (by Florida law) the unit owner has provided proper authorization to receive Hollybrook emails.

To be included in eblasts, please send an email to Communications@holly-brook.com from the email you wish to register. Include your name, building, unit, and telephone number. You may also come to the Administration Building to fill out a paper permission form that will be kept on record as proof of your authorization.

#### Safety first: Enjoy the ride, arrive alive

By William Brittain (Edited, reprinted from March 2021)

With 10 miles of asphalt at Hollybrook to ride our bikes in the beautiful Florida sunshine we must be mindful of safety and of respectfully sharing the road with other cyclists, pedestrians and vehicles.

#### #1: Bicycle and Pedestrian Directions

- Bicycles must ride on the right side of the road going the same direction as the traffic. It's the law.
- Walkers must walk against traffic (traffic coming toward you). When walking with more than one person or one or more pets, beware of oncoming traffic and step to the side of the road so cars are not forced to move into a lane where there could be oncoming traffic. If you stop to chat with friends along the

way, step off the road.

• Ride your bike in the middle of the lane using a mirror to keep an eye on what is behind you and your eyes looking ahead for cars backing out of a parking space. Some people suggest riding to the right of the lane, but if someone starts to back out of a parking space in front of you there is little time to swerve out of the way. The mirror helps you see an approaching car; you can then move right.

#### # 2: Bicycle Safety

- Wear a helmet!
- Keep your brakes working properly.
- Mirror: Because we bicycle in the same direction as traffic, a mirror on the left handlebar is important to help you see when a vehicle is coming



#### Maintenance fee, restaurant card time

It's that time of year again. With the Board of Directors having adopting the 2021/2022 budget, a \$225 charge for the 2022 Restaurant Card is included in your October 2021 maintenance fee. Disbursement of the new



card will begin during the last week of October. You may begin using it right away, if you choose; but remember - it will expire on December 31, 2022.

To receive the card, your Hollybrook account must be paid in full including the October 2021 maintenance payment. The complete October payment is \$1,594.00 for Phase 1-5 and the Towers; the payment is \$1,914.00 for Phase 6.

There are options available to receive your card: by mail; in person by you; or picked up by a designated person you choose.

*Mail* – An eblast, sent out September 23, contains links to the form for the unit owner to complete and send to Administration. The mailing address is Hollybrook Golf & Tennis Club, Attention Celene, 900 Hollybrook Drive, Pembroke Pines, Florida, 33025. You may choose to email the form to controller@hollybrook.com or fax it to 954-437-2969.

**Pickup** – Certain pick up dates are set aside for each Phase. The pickup spot will be at the east door of the Administration Office, by the Memory Garden/bicycle racks, **between 9 - 11 a.m.**

Phase 2 – Tuesday, October 26

Phase 3 & 6 – Wednesday, October 27

Phase 4 – Thursday, October 28

Phase 5 & Towers - Friday, October 29

*By Designated Person* - If you choose to designate someone to pick up your card, you must complete form RC1900. The form must be signed by the unit owner. You may obtain the form through email, through our website, or in person at the Administration Building reception desk.

Vegetarians can leap for meatballs, minus the beef, at The Restaurant at Hollybrook.


"Any recipe that we use ground meat for can now be made into a vegetarian plate," said Restaurant Manger Heather Giblin.

#### 'Willkommen' to 'Cabaret'


Hollybrook's going to PPTOPA's Cabaret By Judy Thomas

#### **Pros & Cons of Coffee**

Coffee has many benefits. It gives you energy, makes you feel smarter and upbeat, provide some nutrients, and may protect you from dementia. But if you drink too much coffee, you may suffer some negative effects.

#### **NEGATIVE EFFECTS OF COFFEE**

Too much of the beverage can cause anxiety and agitation because of its caffeine content, so be sure to limit the cups of coffee you drink per day. Because consuming more than six cups of coffee daily can be detrimental, limit yourself to two or three cups, maximum.

Drinking your java in the afternoon or evening may cause insomnia; caffeine will keep you restless and fully awake. The same coffee you drank in the morning should keep you alert and energized.

If you have cholesterol problems, you might watch your coffee intake because it could increase your LDL (bad) cholesterol and triglycerides. However, research shows that filtered coffee generally reduces those effects.

Because coffee decreases the amount of calcium in your body and can lead to weakened bones, people with or at risk of osteoporosis should consider reducing their coffee intake or switching to decaf.

POSITIVE EFFECTS OF COFFEE

Alzheimer's disease, the most common

neurodegenerative disease, is the leading cause of dementia worldwide. In order to prevent it we must eat healthy and exercise at least three times a week (which could be a simple 30-minute walk). Remarkably, several studies have shown that coffee drinkers have up to a 65% lower risk of Alzheimer's disease.

Other studies indicate that coffee drinkers have a 30 to 60% lowered risk of Parkinson's disease, and a Harvard University study revealed that drinking coffee may lower the risk of depression by 20%. Other studies show that coffee drinkers have a 40% less risk of liver cancer and 15% lower risk of colorectal cancer.

Coffee has a high content of antioxidants and has some nutrients like B2, B3, B5, manganese, potassium and magnesium, which gives us that happy, upbeat feeling. If you have asthma, drinking a couple of cups of coffee may help you to breathe better.

All said, if you enjoy the taste of coffee like I do, have a cup or two in the morning to feel chipper and more alert and to

benefit from other good things that come with java.

On the other hand, if you cannot tolerate coffee because of some side effects, then stay away! Try herbal tea or just plain hot water with a fresh squeeze of real lemon.

- Light and reflec-Reflectors are great day and night to let others know you are present. Use a light in early morning and at dusk so that motorists see you.
- Horn: A horn notifies someone that you are coming. It is also a quirky way to say "hello" to your Hollybrook friends as you cycle by.

• Bicycle size: Be sure that the bicycle is the right size for you and the seat is at the proper height. This is important becuse

a. If your seat height is not correct, you will likely put too much stress on your knees and that could cause damage to your knee joints. b. If the bicycle is too big and/or the seat too high you will not be able to safely use a foot to stop a fall.

#### #3: Don'ts for Bicycling in Hollybrook

- Do not ride bicycles on the wrong side of street. It causes traffic confusion and is hazardous to cyclists riding in the correct direction.
- Do not walk in the direction of traffic; you will not be able to see cars or bicycles coming toward you and you will not be prepared to step or jump out of the way to avoid being hit.
- Do not ride without a helmet. Head injuries could cause a person to be impaired for life.

#### #4: Car Driver Sensitivity

- Lights on: Many bicycle mirrors are not perfectly clear. Your lights allow bicyclists to see your car coming.
- Horn tap: A light tap will let a bike rider know you are there.
- Slow down and heed stop signs: Be courteous to all who share the road by maintaining a 15 mph speed and stopping at stop signs. Remember, running stop signs and speeding are both against the law.

#### Pet Health

#### Aging pets need special diets

As our pet cats and dogs grow older, they start to develop their own set of age-related health problems in a similar way that humans do. Some pets slow down in their old age, but others retain high level energy from their youth, making it hard for us to recognize when they need extra care.

One of the easiest things we can do to keep our aging pets healthy and happy is switch them to a senior diet.

Generally, dogs are considered seniors when they are between 7 and 12 years of age; large breed dogs grow "older" earlier than small breeds. Cats are considered seniors at around 10 years of age. As dogs and cats age, we notice changes in their body composition, partly due to slowing of their metabolic rates and decreases in lean body mass that lead to more body fat. Though they may consume the same amount of food as they did a few years earlier, you may see them gaining weight. Sound familiar?

Your first instinct may be to simply decrease the amount of food you provide but that might not be the best choice. Studies show that increased body fat may be because their body is less able to metabolize fats, which means that fats consumed from the diet simply passes through the animal without being used or





broken down. Reducing the amount of food that you give your pet does not decrease the amount of fat they consume; instead, it reduces the proportion of available fat that your pet *can* use. A better way to alter the amount of fat eaten is to change the quality of fat in their food so the fat eaten will be used. Good quality fat is highly digestible and rich in essential fatty acids (EFAs).

To compensate for increased digestible fats, pet food companies typically lower the proportion of calories that are contributed by fat. That helps decrease the energy density of the diet, which is good for older pets that are less active.

A most important EFAs is gamma-linolenic acid (GLA) which maintains healthy skin and coats. As our pets age, its harder for them to convert EFAs to GLA; dogs are often deficient in GLA. A solution is to give a GLA supplement with your dog's food.

Other supplements may also benefit your senior pet, but check with your veterinarian to be sure that your choice is best for your furry friend. Supplement options may include:

- FOS (fructooligosaccharides): Prebiotic to promote beneficial bacteria growth in your dog's intestines for healthy digestive tract.
- Antioxidants: vitamin E and beta-carotene to boost the immune system.
- Glucosamine (often with chondroitin) for osteoarthritis.

Another misconception about senior pet diets is that protein levels should be reduced to ease protein load filtering through kidneys - which lowers risk of kidney failure. However, protein requirements do not decrease with age; older pets still need protein. This is especially true for cats; they require more protien than dogs. However, if your pet has renal problems, your veterinarian will likely recommoned a lower protien diet.

Most major pet food companies offer diet options for senior dogs and cats. If your pet is "getting up there" in age, chosing a food formulated specifically for older animals is your best bet.

#### Florida, what's in season?

Its October in Florida and here are the what's in season produce; indeed very different than what's in season in Canada. Canadians



are thinking "turkey, cranberries and pumpkin spice", but pumpkin spice *everything* started in August – I can't get on board with this!

Canadians celebrate Thanksgiving in early October, so when many of us travel down

to Florida in late November, we get to be doubly



thankful! But let's forget about pumpkins for now; let's focus on a few things we can make with Florida's October bounty right now.

#### Florida Grouper with Citrus Salad

#### **INGREDIENTS**

- 4 (6-ounce) Florida grouper fillets
- 3 Florida oranges, peeled, seeded and segmented
- 2 Florida grapefruit, peeled, seeded and segmented

1 tablespoon rice wine vinegar

¼ cup fresh flat leaf parsley, chopped

1 fennel bulb, thinly sliced

½ cup jicama, peeled and julienned 4 tablespoons olive oil, divided

Sea salt and fresh ground pepper, to taste

#### PREPARATION

Combine the fennel, jicama, citrus segments, 2 tablespoons of olive oil, vinegar and parsley in a large bowl. Season with salt and pepper and mix thoroughly. Store in the refrigerator until ready to serve.

Preheat 2 tablespoons of oil in a large skillet over medium-high heat. Season grouper fillets with salt and pepper. Carefully place the fillets into pan and sear for two to three minutes per side or until completely done. Serve over chilled citrus salad.

Broward County, we have a more transparent process. Your County Commission relies on maps produced independently by an academic institution – in this case, Florida International University because of their knowledge of our region. Because the process is independent and transparent, fairer maps will represent all elements of our diverse community.

The Census Bureau has released the granular data (demographics and population changes) needed to move forward. Community meetings occurring soon will lead to preliminary maps in October. Maps will be approved by the end of 2021.

Too often, representatives pick their voters. Under our Broward system, voters can pick their representative. That's because there are plenty of opportunities for important community involvement and input that invites residents to weigh in. This includes saying whether your community should be in a certain district, or be grouped with a different area, and much more input and insight that are invaluable to forming the best maps for each area of our community. Public meetings began in late September and resident voices are being heard. The next and final meeting will be held 10 a.m. on October 16 at Champions Hall Community Center, 6601 Boulevard of Champions, in North Lauderdale. I highly encourage you to attend and let the FIU team know your thoughts. Your thoughts and ideas are also welcome via email to redistricting@broward.org.

The name *October* is derived from the Latin "*Octo*" which means eight as October was the eighth month of the year on the Roman calendar. It was called Winterfylleth, meaning the "fullness of winter", by the Anglo-Saxons because the first full moon of the winter season appeared during the month.

This year, Thanksgiving is celebrated in Canada on October 11. It is different than Thanksgiving in the US. Long before Pilgrims settled in North America, Canadians followed the European tradition of har-







#### What to Expect after Getting a COVID-19 Vaccine

The COVID-19 shot may cause side effects in some people. Side effects should go away in a few days.

#### **COMMON SIDE EFFECTS**

#### On the arm where you got the shot:

- Pain
- Redness
- Swelling

#### In the rest of your body:

- Fever
- Headache
- Chills
- Tiredness
   No





#### Ask the facility healthcare provider (or facility staff) for help if:

- The redness or pain where you got the shot gets worse after 24 hours
- Your side effects are worrying you
- Your side effects do not seem to be going away after a few days

#### **HELPFUL TIPS**

If you have pain, headache, or fever, ask a healthcare provider (or facility staff) if you can have medicine.

#### If you are sore where you got the shot:

- Apply a clean, cool, wet washcloth over the area
- Use or move your arm gently

#### If you have a fever:

- · Drink a lot of water
- · Get plenty of rest
- Dress lightly



#### **REMEMBER**

Side effects may make you feel a little sick or even make it hard to do daily activities, but they should go away in a few days. Some COVID-19 vaccines need 2 shots to work. You should get the second shot even if you have side effects after the first shot, unless a doctor tells you not to. COVID-19 vaccines may not fully protect you until a week or two after your final shot. It takes time for your body to build protection after any vaccination.



Even after your COVID-19 vaccination, when you are in a correctional facility, it's important to continue wearing your mask, try to stay at least 6 feet away from others as much as possible, and wash your hands often.
